EXPLANATION OF THE BILL

This bill would repeal the sales and use tax on repairing electronic and precision equipment. The sales tax was imposed on these services in the 2013 legislative session, effective July 1, 2013. This bill would allow for the purchaser to claim a refund of any sales and use taxes that have been paid since these services became taxable on July 1, 2013.

REVENUE ANALYSIS DETAIL

- This estimate assumes that all refunds for previously paid sales taxes will be refunded in fiscal year 2014.
